A READING FROM THE BOOK OF DEUTERONOMY

See, I have set before you today life and prosperity, death and adversity. If you obey the commandments of the Lord your God that I am commanding you today, by loving the Lord your God, walking in his ways, and observing his commandments, decrees, and ordinances, then you shall live and become numerous, and the Lord your God will bless you in the land that you are entering to possess. But if your heart turns away and you do not hear, but are led astray to bow down to other gods and serve them, I declare to you today that you shall perish; you shall not live long in the land that you are crossing the Jordan to enter and possess. I call heaven and earth to witness against you today that I have set before you life and death, blessings and curses. Choose life so that you and your descendants may live, loving the Lord your God, obeying him, and holding fast to him; for that means life to you and length of days, so that you may live in the land that the Lord swore to give to your ancestors, to Abraham, to Isaac, and to Jacob.

Second Reading | Corinthians 3: 1-9

A READING FROM THE FIRST LETTER OF PAUL TO THE CORINTHIANS

And so, brothers and sisters, I could not speak to you as spiritual people, but rather as people of the flesh, as infants in Christ. I fed you with milk, not solid food, for you were not ready for solid food. Even now you are still not ready, for you are still of the flesh. For as long as there is jealousy and quarrelling among you, are you not of the flesh, and behaving according to human inclinations? For when one says, "I belong to Paul," and another, "I belong to Apollos," are you not merely human? What then is Apollos? What is Paul? Servants through whom you came to believe, as the Lord assigned to each. I planted, Apollos watered, but God gave the growth. So neither the one who

plants nor the one who waters is anything, but only God who gives the growth. The one who plants and the one who waters have a common purpose, and each will receive wages according to the labour of each. For we are God's servants, working together; you are God's field, God's building.

The GospelMatthew 5: 21-37

THE HOLY GOSPEL OF OUR LORD JESUS CHRIST ACCORDING TO MATTHEW

Jesus said, "You have heard that it was said to those of ancient times, 'You shall not murder'; and 'whoever murders shall be liable to judgement.' But I say to you that if you are angry with a brother or sister, you will be liable to judgement; and if you insult a brother or sister, you will be liable to the council; and if you say, 'You fool,' you will be liable to the hell of fire. So when you are offering your gift at the altar, if you remember that your brother or sister has something against you, leave your gift there before the altar and go; first be reconciled to your brother or sister, and then come and offer your gift. Come to terms quickly with your accuser while you are on the way to court with him, or your accuser may hand you over to the judge, and the judge to the guard, and you will be thrown into prison. Truly I tell you, you will never get out until you have paid the last penny. You have heard that it was said, 'You shall not commit adultery.' But I say to you that everyone who looks at a woman with lust has already committed adultery with her in his heart. If your right eye causes you to sin, tear it out and throw it away; it is better for you to lose one of your members than for your whole body to be thrown into hell. And if your right hand causes you to sin, cut it off and throw it away; it is better for you to lose one of your members than for your whole body to go into hell. It was also said, 'Whoever divorces his wife, let him give her a certificate of divorce.' But I say to you that anyone who divorces his wife, except on the ground of unchastity, causes her to commit adultery; and whoever marries a divorced woman commits adultery. Again, you have heard that it was said to those of ancient times, 'You shall not swear falsely, but carry out the vows you have made to the Lord.' But I say to you, Do not swear at all, either by heaven, for it is the throne of God, or by the earth, for it is his footstool, or by Jerusalem, for it is the city of the great King. And do not swear by your head, for you cannot make one hair white or black. Let your word be 'Yes, Yes' or 'No, No'; anything more than this comes from the evil one."

Sermon

We all know someone whom we could best describe as "an angry person." They rarely if ever forget anything negative that has happened to them. Franklin Roosevelt's closest political advisor was a man named Louis Howe. Mr. Howe, with some frequency, would be very rude and cruel to certain people at dinner or cocktail parties. On one such occasion Eleanor Roosevelt asked, "Louis, why did you do that?" "Because," Howe replied, "he was once unsupportive of Franklin." "Oh goodness," Eleanor exclaimed, "I'd forgotten all about that."

"I never forget," Howe snapped back.

And that's just the way some people go at life: they nurse old wounds and so allow them to fester into an entire cesspool of resentment and anger.

Jesus knows the utter untruth of the old saying, "Sticks and stones may break my bones but words will never hurt me." When people hurl words at us that cast our mental or moral abilities into question, these angry words reach places inside our nervous systems where no laser can reach. God is against such angry words because they kill the spirit.

In today's Gospel, Jesus is conveying harshwords about the damage we cause to others through anger and the abuse of relationships. The harm we cause to ourselves and others when we crave for things we can't have or compromise trusts. The commitments we make, then break in our daily life; but Jesuschallenges, the Rabbi's and the people of Israelon their rigid and narrow interpretations of the ancient Jewish laws of Moses. They are stuck in the past. And sometimes we are too.

I read a story recently about Alexander the third, the tsar of Russia from 1881-1894. He was known as a harsh person who would abuse others with his words and actions. His rule was marked by autocratic leadership and repression, and in particular, by his persecution of the Jews. His wife, Maria, provided a stark contrast, being known especially for her generosity to those in need. On one occasion, it is said, her husband had signed an order consigning a prisoner to life in exile. The order simply read,

Pardon impossible, ---- to be condemned and sent to Siberia.

Maria changed that prisoner's life by simply moving a comma. She altered the order and changed the meaning to...

"Pardon, ----- impossible to condemn to Siberia. A small action that had a huge impact for one human being.

In Christ, God has changed and moved the comma that stood against us to the good news of salvation. Christ's sacrificial saving act for humanity; One action with a huge impact for all of us. The Gospel of Matthew has been described as the swinging door that connects the Old Testament reader to the New. Jesus in his teaching calls us to a new life in God, and gifts us freedom to choose a new broader way of thinking about the Jewish laws of Moses. He uses examples in every-day life as a grounding to build his case, to move thinking and actions towards righteousness. He intensifies and radicalizes those familiar laws from the Old Testament for those who listen, and extends their purpose into every facet of their lives.

And Jesus says right at the beginning of Matthew 5; Blessed are the merciful, for they will receive mercy. Blessed are the peacemakers. Blessed are those who are persecuted for righteousness sake, and Blessedare you when people revile you on my account.

The Law of God that was established thousands of years ago, was meant to foster human flourishing at every level, including at the deepest levels of our hearts and minds. God wants us to respect each other, to love each other, to see God's own image residing deep within one another, and to live our lives with a forgiving and loving heart. Amen.
