A READING FROM THE BOOK OF DEUTERONOMY

Then Moses went up from the plains of Moab to Mount Nebo, to the top of Pisgah, which is opposite Jericho, and the Lord showed him the whole land: Gilead as far as Dan, all Naphtali, the land of Ephraim and Manasseh, all the land of Judah as far as the Western Sea, the Negeb, and the Plain that is, the valley of Jericho, the city of palm trees as far as Zoar. As you know and as God is our

witness, we never came with words of flattery or with a pretext for greed; nor did we seek praise from mortals, whether from you or from others, though we might have made demands as apostles of Christ. So deeply do we care for you that we are determined to share with you not only the gospel of God but also our own selves, because you have become very dear to us.

Sermon

Who is afraid of heights? I am. And yet there was a time in my life when I couldn't get enough of the adrenaline that would rush through my body at the mere potential of bungee jumping, white water rafting, or yes even walking around the top of the CN tower. I' ve done it all.

Psychologists say there are three types of people. Folks that lead with their head, heart, or gut. I am a head person. I understand that rock climbing is just about the safest thing you can do, you are triple redundantly fastened to that wall. You might fall a bit but you are not going to die. This is why I am a follower of Jesus. I might get hurt along the way, but I am not going to die. And if I do, well there's always the second coming.

That is not to say my heart doesn't hurt or radiate compassion, or that my gut doesn't cringe when I hear of the terrible things that are done in the name of religion or glory in the feasting of the gathered community. I do my best to be a whole person, a holy person. Some days are better than others. Today in Matthew's gospel we continue on our journey with Jesus arguing with the pharisees, if you think we've been talking about this a lot lately, you are right. The lectionary goes on about for 6 weeks. We are still in the temple, the holy of holies. The religious leaders we call the Pharisees are trying to trip Jesus up and get him to answer one of their questions inappropriately. Today they go for the biggest religious question they can think of. Which commandment in the law is the greatest? Jesus nails it. He responds with the Shema, "Love the Lord our God with all your heart, mind, body and soul". The Jews repeat this prayer twice every day! So they asked Jesus for one commandment and they got the answer they were expecting. But then, unexpectantly, Jesus keeps talking. He adds a

second command, that is also rooted in love. But this time, the love is for your neighbour, just as yourself.

I went out to Vancouver in the early 90's and had the opportunity to walk across the Capilano Suspension bridge. It is really big (230 ft above the river below), really long (450 ft), with no support beams just a bunch of wires to hold you up. It wobbles and sways, especially when it is windy and busy. The thing about the bridge is that it is anchored on both sides. With a whole bunch of concrete. 13 cubic feet of the solid stuff on either side. It might scare you, but you are not going to die. These love commandments anchor our existence as God's people. Holiness is not unidirectional; it flows in all directions. And doesn't this make sense, given what we know about God? If God is love, and in God we live and move and have our being, then we are anchored in the overflowing streams of love. All of creation exists because our loving God willed it into being. After all, "for God so loved the world, that he gave his only begotten Son.".

Love is our base function, what it means to be image bearers of God. If we were only given one word to describe the message of the prophets and all of the laws given to God's people, then, according to Jesus, that word is love. Paul prays it for us in Ephesians 3: I pray that.. Christ may dwell in your hearts through faith, as you are rooted and grounded in love."

All of these passages use the same Greek verb for love from the noun *agape*. Agape love is the one rooted in flourishing for all. It is community-building at the largest level. Love towards God, love towards others, is world-building—just as God designed. Because we fail through sin, God gave us the law and the prophets to invite us back. All of the Law and the message of the prophets were meant for this same end: building and keeping the world the way God wants it to be.

Jesus highlights how the pieces that were already there, fit together and reveal a grander foundation in the Messiah of love. Adding the second great command to the first revealed that the trajectory of the believer's life is not just measured upwards but sideways. And now, by showing the Pharisees that a theologically significant detail has been under their very noses this whole time, he is showing all of us that there is always more to learn and have revealed by God.

Love expands existence and knowledge. In a way, it's a warning to us not to become too complacent with the points of belief and doctrine that we cling to—we may be ignoring an equally important lens or tenet. Like the Pharisees, we might get stuck on one answer, but that answer could actually be incomplete. With God, things can always get bigger and better.

Being schooled in the way God's law is held together by the greatest commandment (both of them) and being shown by this itinerant preacher that they do not have all of the answers has led the Pharisees to some humility. God has used their righteousness to teach them some humility. More importantly to teach them that the Scriptures point to a grand reality rooted in love and how the world is ruled by a Messiah who we cannot quite wrap our heads around. With God, things can always get bigger and better.

While Christ's revealing work through the Holy Spirit may continue to upset your experience of the world we live in, it will only change your perspective, and it won't kill you. God wants you to love the Lord your God, and your neighbour as yourself. It won't kill you. It might scare you to death, but the adrenaline is worth it. What do you need to do to step beyond your comfort zone regarding your faith? Take a leap!

Step out in faith, my friends, Amen.

Gaza Hospital Appeal

Dear Friends.

The news has been covering the blast at a hospital in Gaza called the Al-Ahli Hospital (which translates to simply mean "The Family Hospital"). Some news outlets are referring to it as a Baptist hospital, but it is run by the Anglican Diocese of Jerusalem.

Al-Ahli Anglican Episcopal Hospital is the oldest hospital in Gaza, founded in 1882 by the Church of England. It receives no funding whatsoever by Hamas (contrary to some reports).

Its mission is unique in that it provides healthcare to anyone, regardless of their religion, ethnicity, or political affiliation.

In my capacity as the Diocesan chair of our global outreach, the Primate's World Relief and Development Fund, I'm letting you know of an initial \$30,000 that PWRDF has transferred to the hospital. We have supported this hospital for years as a partner, and are actively accepting donations for Al-Ahli Arab Hospital through the PWRDF Gaza Hospital Appeal.
