A READING FROM THE BOOK OF JUDGES

The Israelites again did what was evil in the sight of the Lord, after Ehud died. Sothe Lord sold them into the hand of King Jabin of Canaan, who reigned in Hazor; the commander of his army was Sisera, who lived in Haroshethhagoiim. Then the Israelites cried out to the Lord for help; for he had nine hundred chariots of iron, and had oppressed the Israelites cruelly twenty years. At that time Deborah, a prophetess, wife of Lappidoth, was judging Israel. She used to sit under the palm of Deborah between Ramah and Bethel in the hill country of Ephraim; and the Israelites came up to her for judgement. She sent and summoned Barak son ofAbinoam from Kedesh in Naphtali, and said to him, "The Lord, the God of Israel, commands you, 'Go, take position at Mount Tabor, bringing ten thousand from the tribe of Naphtali and the tribe of Zebulun. I will draw out Sisera, the general ofJabin's army, to meet you by the Wadi Kishon with his chariots and his troops; and I will give him into your hand."

A READING FROM THE FIRST LETTER OF PAUL TO THE THESSALONIANS

Now concerning the times and the seasons, brothers and sisters, you do not need to have anything written to you. For you yourselves know very well that the day of the Lord will come like a thief in the night. When they say, "There is peace and security," then sudden destruction will come upon them, as labour pains come upon a pregnant woman, and there will be no escape! But you, beloved, are not in darkness, for that day to surprise you like a thief; for you are all children of light and children of the day; we are not of the night or of darkness. So then let us not fall asleep as others do, but let us keep awake and be sober; for those who sleep sleepat night, and those who are drunk get drunk at night. But since we belong to the day, let us be sober, and put on the breastplate of faith and love, and for a helmet the hope of salvation. For God has destined us not for wrath but for obtaining salvation through our Lord Jesus Christ, who died for us, so that whether we are awake or asleep we may live

with him. Therefore encourage one another and build up each other, as indeed you are doing.

THE HOLY GOSPEL OF OUR LORD JESUS CHRIST ACCORDING TO MATTHEW

Jesus said, "For it is as if a man, going on a journey, summoned his slaves and entrusted his property to them; to one he gave five talents, to another two, to another one, to each according to his ability. Then he went away. The one who had received the five talents went off at once and traded with them, and made five more talents. In the same way, the one who had the two talents made two more talents. But the one who had received the one talent went off and dug a hole in the ground and hid his master's money. After a long time the master of those slaves came and settled accounts with them. Then the one who had received the five talents came forward, bringing five more talents, saying, 'Master, you handed over to me five talents; see, I have made five more talents.' His master said to him, 'Well done, good and trustworthy slave; you have been trustworthy in a few things, I will put you in charge of many things; enter into the joy of your master.' And the one with the two talents also came forward, saying, 'Master, you handed over to me two talents; see, I have made two more talents.' His master said to him, 'Well done, good and trustworthy slave; you have been trustworthy in a few things, I will put you in charge of many things; enter into the joy of your master.' Then the one who had received the one talent also came forward, saying, 'Master, I knew that you were a harsh man, reaping where you did not sow, and gathering where you did not scatter seed; so I was afraid, and I went and hid your talent in the ground. Here you have what is yours.' But his master replied, 'You wicked and lazy slave! You knew, did you, that I reap where I did not sow, and gather where I did not scatter? Then you ought to have invested my money with the bankers, and on my return I would have received what was my own with interest. So take the talent from him, and give it to the one with the ten talents. For to all those who have, more will be given, and they will have an abundance; but from those who have nothing, even what they have will be taken away. As for this worthless slave, throw him into the outer darkness, where there will be weeping and gnashing of teeth."

Sermon

Collaborative Talents November 19th, 2023 Matthew 25:14-30

Today's Gospel conveys the message of responsible stewardship and the importance of using one's abilities and resources for good. During Jesus' time, the concept of a formal church as we know it today did not exist. However, people did contribute to the worship and religious practices of their time. They participated in synagogue services, observed Jewish festivals, and engaged in communal rituals. Individuals often demonstrated their faith through acts of charity, adherence to religious laws, and communal prayers. In terms of talents, people likely contributed through skills such as craftsmanship for the construction of the temple, musical abilities for worship, and teaching within the community. The Gospel accounts also highlight various individuals, such as fishermen and tax collectors, who left their professions to follow Jesus, using their talents and experiences to contribute to his ministry. While the organizational structure may differ from contemporary churches, the essence of using one's talents for the glory of God was evident in the way people lived out their faith

during Jesus' time. Those who chose to live for the glory of God, especially in following Jesus during His time, did encounter conflicts and resistance from various quarters; but it's important to note that experiences varied widely, and many Christians coexisted peacefully with others of different beliefs. However, conflicts did arise, and navigating them often required open dialogue, understanding, and a commitment to promoting mutual respect and tolerance. In the classic Canadian tale called "The Hockey Sweater", a young boy in a small village is a devoted fan of the Montreal Canadiens hockey team. When his beloved Canadiens jersey becomes too small, his mother orders him a new one. However, a mix-up occurs, and he receives a Toronto Maple Leafs jersey instead. The story unfolds as the boy copes with being the only one in his community wearing the rival team's colours. While "The Hockey Sweater" is more about embracing differences and overcoming challenges, it indirectly portrays the idea of using one's talents or passions to foster unity and understanding within a community. It's a beloved story that has become an integral part of Canadian literature and culture. The young boy faces the dilemma of receiving a Toronto Maple Leafs jersey instead of his beloved Montreal Canadiens jersey. Instead of accepting the situation, the boy writes a letter to the company, asking for a Canadiens jersey to replace the one he mistakenly received. The resolution comes when the company sends a package, and to the boy's dismay, it contains not one but several Toronto Maple Leafs iersevs. The boy, feeling defeated, wears one of the Leafs jerseys to play hockey with his friends. The story concludes with the realization that, despite the team jersey differences, they are all just kids playing hockey together.

The story's message revolves around unity, friendship, and accepting differences, emphasizing that even though the boy's passion lies with the Canadiens, he can still find common ground and camaraderie with those who support a different team.

The theme of learning to support a different "team" or religious perspective is quite relevant for fostering understanding, acceptance, and unity among people of different faiths. Embracing diversity in religious beliefs and practices is an essential aspect of promoting tolerance and peaceful coexistence.

Just as the boy in "The Hockey Sweater" found common ground with his friends despite their different team affiliations, individuals from various religious backgrounds can come together, recognizing shared values, promoting respect, and building bridges of understanding. Interfaith dialogue and cooperation contribute to a more harmonious and inclusive society, emphasizing the importance of acceptance and goodwill among people of diverse religious beliefs.

The teachings in Matthew's gospel, particularly the Parable of the Talents (Matthew 25:14-30), can be interpreted as a call to use one's abilities and resources for the betterment of humankind. The idea of investing and multiplying talents can extend beyond individual skills to include acts of kindness, charity, and efforts to contribute positively to society, aligning with the broader concept of love and compassion emphasized in Christian teachings.
