THE HOLY GOSPEL OF OUR LORD JESUS CHRIST ACCORDING TO JOHN

There was a man sent from God, whose name was John. He came as a witness to testify to the light, so that all might believe through him. He himself was not the light, but he came to testify to the light. This is the testimony given by John when the Jews sent priests and Levites from Jerusalem to ask him, "Who are you?" He confessed and did not deny it, but confessed, "I am not the Messiah." And they asked him, "What then? Are you Elijah?" He said, "I am not." "Are you the prophet?" He answered, "No." Then they said to him, "Who are you? Let us have an answer for those who sent us. What do you say about yourself?" He said, "I am the voice of one crying out in the wilderness, 'Make straight the way of the Lord,'" as the prophet Isaiah said. Now they had been sent from the Pharisees. They asked him, "Why then are you baptizing if you are neither the Messiah, nor Elijah, nor the prophet?" John answered them, "I baptize with water. Among you stands one whom you do not know, the one who is coming after me; I am not worthy to untie the thong of his sandal." This took place in Bethany across the Jordan where John was baptizing.

Sermon

Advent 3

John the Baptist is given the once over with questions that could be quite skeptical or they could be just curious. It depends on what we think of the folks asking the questions. This is the hard part of knowing what the bible is saying. How well do we know the characters in the story? Have we contemplated these stories over a lifetime, or are you just hearing them for the first time? Do you pour over the text like a scholar reading the Greek and Hebrew or is it just a cute story for kids? Maybe somewhere in between.

Last week the crowds came to see John down by the riverside, mostly because they were curious—it was the latest thing to do. And yes it's hard to be open-minded about the leaders of the religion, they are a skeptical bunch, always seeing threats to their power in any new thing that is happening. We tend to feel that way about the culture around us too. They certainly feel entitled to offer up their opinion of who John is. There is more than one agenda here.

The Pharisees reveal their thinking in their line of questioning. These are questions of identity. Who is he? Messiah, Elijah, prophet? Has he come to turn the world around? That is what his preaching was getting at: inviting us to live in God's way not necessarily the Pharisees' way. And this is the problem, the two should be synonymous, but they are not. John does something that the Pharisees should be doing, but they do not, calling the people towards God's righteousness. Malachi and Deuteronomy say repeatedly that the Messiah, Elijah and the prophets all do this. So why do they stay away from these prophetic voices which they have inherited? It is scary, isn't it? If people don't like the message they might not like the messenger.

This is why I like John so much, besides being my namesake, he is also humble. I mean he is like Elijah who speaks words of warning to the people. He is like the prophets who prepare the way of

the Lord. Even Jesus will say that John is *his* Elijah in Matthew 11, but these are not titles he cares to take for himself. None of this is about John, it is about God working in the world.

This is why I love Baptism so much, as a rite it helps us connect to God in a way that we see ourselves in God's story. It helps us see the light of the world, shining on us. It helps others see the light shining on them. The water, the oil, the candle, all come together with your family and the people of God for one tiny moment, to rekindle the flame, of the light of the world in each of us.

This is a journey for each of us to undertake each year at Christmas. If you're not feeling too Christmas-y yet then maybe it's important to remember that while John lept for joy at meeting Jesus in utero, later on when he was locked up by Herod, he sent his disciples to question Jesus, "Are you the one who is to come or do we wait for another?" this is the depth of fear that can overcome us, even when we are called to be the one who proclaims the way of the Lord. The way of Jesus is never easy.

John's story reminds me that Advent is crucial to our understanding of Christmas. It is not just a feeling that we conjure up with too many Hallmark movies. We must go on this journey, from joy to repentance, from work to being called, from testifying to questioning, and from seeking His presence in the darkness to the revelation of the prince of peace. And like John the Baptist, we do it all, so that all people, including ourselves, might believe. There is a fuzzy feeling, at the end.

Even as John confesses some doubt about who Jesus might be, Jesus never stops believing in John, he praises his witness that John offers and reminds us all that our witness is the most important part of the whole story. So, how have you witnessed to others the importance of Jesus at Christmas? Is it all about the parties and presents, the fruitcake and turkey, or is the salvation of the whole world set in motion at this time of year? And in case you thought it was too late to change your mind, Christmas Eve is yet to come, join us on the 24th at 5 pm. Where we will invite the whole world to change yet again, at Christmas time.
